Employment may be a required component of these courses, or students may be required to enroll concurrently in a work experience course.

Course content may also include consumer education and personal money management topics.

Course Description: Exploring Computer Science courses present students with the conceptual underpinnings of computer science through an exploration of human-computer interaction, web design, computer programming, data modeling, and robotics. While these courses include programming, the focus is on the computational practices associated with doing computer science, rather than just a narrow focus on coding, syntax, or tools. Exploring Computer Science courses teach students the computational practices of algorithm design, problem-solving, and programming within a context that is relevant to their lives.

Course Description: Students in the Health and Life Management courses will focus as much on consumer education topics (such as money management and evaluation of consumer information and advertising) as on personal health topics (such as nutrition, stress management, drug/alcohol abuse prevention, disease prevention, and first aid). Course objectives include helping students develop decision-making, communication, interpersonal, and coping skills and strategies.

Course Description: Students in the Life Skills course will be provided information about a wide range of subjects to assist students in becoming wise consumers and productive adults. These courses often emphasize such topics as goal setting, decision making, and setting priorities; money and time management; relationships; and the development of the self. Practical exercises regarding selecting and furnishing houses, meeting transportation needs, preparing food, selecting clothing, and building a wardrobe are often integral to these classes. In addition, specific topics such as insurance, taxation, and consumer protection may also be covered.

Course Description: Principles of Technology courses focus on the study of the forces and laws of nature and their application to modern technology. Equilibrium, motion, momentum, energy conversion, electromagnetism, and optical phenomena are presented in the context of current, real-world applications. Demonstrations, mathematics labs, and applied laboratory experiments are an integral part of the Principles of Technology curriculum. These courses may enable

students to gain a solid foundation for careers in electronics, robotics, telecommunications, and other technological fields.

Topics typically include assessing nutrient content, the science of food and nutrition, physiology, and utilization of nutrients. Course content may also cover additives, contaminants, food-borne illnesses, and food technology.

This is the second course in the coherent sequence for Computer Maintenance. This program prepares students to apply technical knowledge and skills to maintaining and repairing various computer systems from desktop computers, tablets, personal, handheld, and related electronic devices. Emphasis is given to hardware repair/ maintenance, data recovery, and virus removal.

English Language Arts

English I AZ01001

Curriculum: Beyond Textbooks, SRA Corrective Reading, SRA Reading to Achieve

Course Description: Students in the English I course will be taught to build upon their prior knowledge of grammar, vocabulary, word usage, and the mechanics of writing, and usually include the four aspects of language use: reading, writing, speaking, and listening. Typically, these courses introduce and define various genres of literature, with writing exercises often linked to reading selections.

English II AZ01002

Grade: 10

Program: All

Credit: 1 English

Grade Scale: A-F or Pass/Fail

Location offered: Phoenix Upper Campus, Tucson Upper Campus

Curriculum: Beyond Textbooks, SRA Corrective Reading, SRA Reading to Achieve

Course Description: Students in the English II course will be taught a balanced focus on composition and literature. Typically, students learn about the alternate aims and audiences of written compositions by writing persuasive, critical, and creative multi-paragraph essays and compositions. Through the study of various genres of literature, students can improve their reading rate and comprehension and develop the skills to determine the author's intent and theme and to recognize the techniques used by the author to deliver his or her message.

English III AZ01003

Curriculum: Beyond Textbooks, SRA Corrective Reading, SRA Reading to Achieve

Course Description: Students in the English III course will be taught to develop their writing skills, emphasizing clear, logical writing patterns, word choice, and usage, as students write essays and begin to learn the techniques of writing research papers. Students continue to read works of literature, which often form the backbone of the writing assignments. Literary conventions and stylistic devices may receive greater emphasis than in previous courses.

English IV AZ01004

Course Description: Students in the English IV course will be taught to blend composition and literature into a cohesive whole as students write critical and comparative analyses of selected literature, continuing to develop their language arts skills. Typically, students primarily write multi-paragraph essays, but they may also write one or more major research papers.

Algebra I AZ02052

Credit: 1.0 Mathematics

Grade Scale: A-F or Pass/Fail

Curriculum: Beyond Textbooks

Course Description: Students in the Algebra I course will be taught the study of properties and operations of the real number system; evaluating rational algebraic expressions; solving and graphing first-degree equations and inequalities; translating word problems into equations; operations with and factoring of polynomials; and solving simple quadratic equations.

Algebra II AZ02056

Credit: 1.0 Mathematics

Curriculum: Beyond Textbooks

Course Description: Students in the Algebra II course will be taught topics that typically include field properties and theorems; set theory; operations with rational and irrational expressions; factoring of rational expressions; in-depth study of linear equations and inequalities; quadratic equations; solving systems of linear and quadratic equations; graphing of constant, linear, and quadratic equations; properties of higher degree equations; and operations with rational and irrational exponents.

Curriculum: Beyond Textbooks & AZACS Curriculum

Course Description: Students in the Consumer Math course will be taught general math topics (such as arithmetic using rational numbers, measurement, ratio and proportion, and basic statistics) and how to apply these skills to consumer problems and situations. Applications typically include budgeting, taxation, credit, banking services, insurance, buying and selling products and services, home and/or car ownership and rental, managing personal income, and investment.

Students in the Geometry course will be introduced to an abstract, formal approach to the study of geometry, typically including topics such as properties of plane and solid figures; deductive methods of reasoning, and use of logic; geometry as an axiomatic system including the study of postulates, theorems, and formal proofs; concepts of congruence, similarity, parallelism, perpendicularity, and proportion; and rules of angle measurement in triangles.

Course Description: Students in the Physical and Health Education class will be provided with knowledge, experience, and an opportunity to develop skills in a variety of sports or activities (for example, team sports, individual/dual sports, recreational sports, and fitness/conditioning activities) integrated with instruction in personal health (for example, nutrition, mental health, and stress management, drug/alcohol abuse prevention, injury and disease prevention, and first aid) and consumer health issues.

Course Description: Students in the World History and Geography course will be provided an overview of world geography. These courses are often developed in response to increased national concern regarding the importance of geography, and they explore geographical concepts.

Location offered: Phoenix Upper Campus, Tucson Upper Campus

Curriculum: Beyond Textbooks

Course Description: Students in the Comprehensive course will be provided with an overview of the history of the United States, examining periods from discovery or colonialism through World War II or after. These courses typically include a historical overview of political, military, scientific, and social developments. Course content may include a history of the North American peoples before European settlement.

Economics AZ04201

Credit: .5 Social Studies

Grade Scale: A-F or Pass/Fail

Location offered: Phoenix Upper Campus, Tucson Upper Campus

Curriculum: Beyond Textbooks

Course Description: Students in the Economics courses will be provided with an overview of economics with primary emphasis on the principles of microeconomics and the U.S. economic system. These courses may also cover topics such as principles of macroeconomics, international economics, and comparative economics. Economic principles may be presented in formal theoretical contexts, applied contexts, or both.

Curriculum: Beyond Textbooks

Course Description: Students in the Government courses will be provided with an overview of the structure and functions of the U.S. government and political institutions and examine constitutional principles, the concepts of rights and responsibilities, the role of political parties and interest groups, and the importance of civic participation in the democratic process. These courses may examine the structure and function of state and local governments and may cover certain economic and legal topics.

Course Description: Students in the Biology course will be provided with information regarding the fundamental concepts of life and life processes. This course includes such topics as cell structure and function, general plant and animal physiology, genetics, and taxonomy.

Curriculum: Beyond Textbooks & Inspire Science

Course Description: Students in the Earth and Space course will be introduced to the study of the Earth from a local and global perspective. In this course, students typically learn about time zones, latitude and longitude, atmosphere, weather, climate, matter, and energy transfer. Advanced topics often include the study of the use of remote sensing, computer visualization, and computer modeling to enable Earth scientists to understand Earth as a complex and changing planet.

Common themes covered include systems, models, energy, patterns, change, and constancy. These courses use appropriate aspects from each specialty to investigate applications of the theme.
